KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



Professor Sharlene Swartz Keynote speaker staff conference

Prof Sharlene Swartz is a Research Director at the Human Sciences Research Council in South Africa, an adjunct Associate Professor of Sociology at the University of Cape Town, and an occasional visiting fellow at Harvard University and the University of Cambridge. Her expertise centres on youth development and social justice for young people in adversity, and on restitution and redress in the South African context and elsewhere. She teaches about people-centred national development as well as on the effects of race and class on people's lives. Her education was somewhat eclectic - She has undergraduate degrees from Wits University (life sciences) and from the University of Zululand (theology) in South Africa.

Prof Swarts is also an author of, amongst other books, *Ikasi: The Moral Ecology of South Africa's Township Youth* (2009); *Teenage Tata: Voices of Young Fathers in South Africa* (2009); *Old Enough to Know: Consulting Children About Sex Education in Africa* (2012); *Youth Citizenship and the Politics of Belonging* (2013), and most recently *Another Country: Everyday Social Restitution* (2016). She is increasingly writing for a wider audience outside of academia. She aspires to one day be able to write children's books on issues of justice.

Prof Swarts is an activist with a career that began as a youth worker (the first 12 years!) and was active in anti-racism education as well as life skills education with young people as the AIDs scourge hit South Africa and the world. She is currently involved in a number of NGOs but spends most of her time and effort with
The Restitution Foundation">The Restitution Foundation, a small Cape Town based NGO that punches far beyond its size.



Dr Rhonda Vanshay Sharpe Key Note Speaker-Postgraduate Conference

Dr. Rhonda Vonshay Sharpe is the founder and president of the Women's Institute for Science, Equity and Race, the first think tank to focus solely on the social, economic, cultural and political well-being of women of color. She is the co-editor of the Review of Black Political Economy and served as the past President of the National Economic Association. In 2018, she was named 1 of 25 Black Scholars You Should Know by thebestschools.org.

Her research focuses on gender and racial inequality; the diversity of STEM; and the demography of higher education. Her recent publications include: "We've to Build the Pipeline: What's the Problem and What's Next?" "HBCUs: Creating a Scientific Workforce Outta 15 Cents" in Setting a New Agenda for Student Engagement and Retention in Historically Black Colleges and Universities. Dr Sharpe research has been featured on the PBS News Hour, in the New York Times, and on the Kerri Miller Show. She is a recurring guest on the BBC's Business Matters. Rhonda serves on the boards of the International Association of Feminist Economists and Diversifying and Decolonizing Economics.

She has served on the faculty at Barnard College, Bennett College, Bucknell University, Columbia University, Duke University, and the University of Vermont. She is the co-founder of the Diversity Initiative for Tenure in Economics (DITE) for which she served as the Associate Director from 2008 to 2014. She was the 2008-09 Institute of Higher Education Law & Governance Fellow at the University of Houston Law Center. She is the co-recipient of the 2004 Rhonda Williams Prize from the International Association for Feminist Economists. She was a Carolina Minority Postdoctoral Fellow in the economics department at UNC-Chapel Hill.
